There are more than 200 residents working throughout Newfoundland and Labrador. These physicians deliver round the clock medical care to patients and their families whether it is in the ICU, surgical or medical wards, delivery room or out-patient clinics. In addition to their clinical duties, residents are active in academic research and are key contributors to medical education by teaching medical students, peers and other healthcare professionals.
